

Dayn Broder is a big proponent of new and innovative work, specializing in graphic novels and comics. They are celebrated for being the creator of the original disabled Marvel Spiderhero "The Amazing Sun-Spider." Dayn aims to help people realize their potential and craft the best stories possible. Dayn received a Master's degree in Sequential Arts from the Savannah College of Art and Design, and a BFA in Illustration with a concentration in Visual Communication. Dayn has been published in the Huffington Post and designed and edited more than 20 titles in their time at Webtoon. They are considered a prominent advocate for marginalized stories and storytellers, including stories by and for people of color, disabled people, LGBTQ+ people, and other underrepresented persons.

RANELL SHUBERT NONFICTION ACCESS INITIATIVE FUNDS PROGRAM MANAGER - INTERNATIONAL DOCUMENTARY ASSOCIATION

Ranell Shubert is the Nonfiction Access Initiative (NAI) Funds Program Manager at the International Documentary Association (IDA), a movement aimed at narrative change through building power and community and increasing opportunities for nonfiction media-makers who identify as disabled. She also teaches Podcast Production at the University of Southern California. Before joining IDA and NAI, she produced the What's Up With Docs Podcast and worked with the 11N4 Coalition to create artist development programs for creatives with disabilities. Ranell has ten years of experience in artist support programs and education, film festivals and industry programming, production, pitching, funding, advocacy, and distribution, and provides creative and professional consultation to nonfiction storytellers of various forms, from film, series, podcasts, and immersive content.



STEWART IREL ARTISTIC & CREATIVE DIRECTOR - GRAND PERFORMANCES

Stewart has been involved with the arts for over 20 years, having worked in the world of live theater and music performances as an artist, director, and producer. As the Managing and Technical Director of the theater company at Playhouse West — one of LA's most prestigious acting schools — for just over a decade, he was a prolific writer and director, while lending his talents to productions with lighting/sound design, prop creation, and as co-director of the annual film festival. He spent 12 years at Universal Studios Hollywood managing the entertainment program on CityWalk, producing large events as well as booking live bands. He also led a nightly entertainment program where he auditioned, developed and promoted performers. The program was successful having some performers be discovered by industry executives who have signed them to recording and management deals.



HOLLY PULLAR BREATHWORKER, WRITER, AND FILMMAKER

Holly Pullar has over 20 years of caregiving experience for individuals with special needs, mental illness, and developmental disabilities, from children to adults. Holly also helped train law enforcement to help these individuals during a crisis. She's also a breathworker. Beyond caregiving, Holly earned an MFA in screenwriting and has made multiple indie films. She and her ex-husband juggled three jobs and turned their home into an Airbnb to finance their acclaimed feature film 'MY APOCALYPTIC THANKSGIVING,' which won Best Script and Best Actor at the 2022 Entr'2 Marches in Cannes. She also has read scripts for six years at the Austin Film Festival and her film 'plAy Date' was nominated for best short short drama at the 2022 City of Angels Film Festival. She lives in LA with her two saucy kitties.



ISAAC ZABLOCKI DIRECTOR OF FILM PROGRAMS - JCC MANHATTAN, DIRECTOR & CO-FOUNDER - REELABILITIES FILM FESTIVAL: NEW YORK

Isaac Zablocki is the Director of Film Programs at the Marlene Meyerson JCC Manhattan with a rich background in multiple aspects of the film industry. After graduating from Columbia University's film school, he worked at Miramax Films and later produced and directed feature films while also developing educational programs for the Department of Education. He has been instrumental in shaping the film landscape at JCC Manhattan, including the establishment of the Israel Film Center and the annual programming of several film festivals such as the Other Israel Film Festival, which highlights the stories of Arab and underrepresented populations in Israel, and the ReelAbilities Film Festival, the largest festival in the world showcasing films by and about people with disabilities.

ATIN MEHRA DIRECTOR/PRODUCER/DIRECTOR OF PHOTOGRAPHY

Award-winning filmmaker Atin Mehra was born and raised in Varanasi, India and currently resides with his family in Los Angeles, CA. In 1999 Atin picked up his first camera and began taking photographs. Atin's uncanny ability to connect with individuals from behind the lens eventually led him into filmmaking. His own struggles with abuse and discrimination in India draw him to stories of marginalized individuals and communities. Atin lived in India until 2005, when he moved to the US with his wife and filmmaking partner, Mae Thornton Mehra. They have been producing social justice and impact driven films together for over 15 years at Orange Kite Productions. BEING MICHELLE (2022) is Atin's directorial debut for which he is a 2022 Firelight Media Impact Campaign Fund Grantee.



DELBERT WHETTER EXECUTIVE PRODUCER



Mae Thornton Mehra has been producing social justice and impact driven films with her husband and filmmaker, Atin Mehra at Orange Kite Productions for over 15 years. She prides herself on openly creative collaborations between film participants and diverse production teams as she believes that impact begins within the filmmaking process itself. In 2020, Mae and Atin co-founded the nonprofit Thriving Roots Initiative to further their work of social impact documentary filmmaking. Mae is Producer on BEING MICHELLE (2022), a documentary film that is helping to change the way Deaf and Disabled people are treated in criminal justice systems in the US and globally.

CJ is a living legend in the deaf and hearing world, acclaimed for his humor, creativity, and inspiration. He has done it all. Playing Joseph in the 2017 blockbuster "Baby Driver" directed by Edgar Wright, CJ became the first black deaf actor in an international Blockbuster. He also worked as the Creator of Navi Sign Language on the Avatar Sequels with the brilliant James Cameron. CJ founded SignWorld Studios as well as nonprofit SignLight, with a mission to create a film training program for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing. CJ Jones has received many awards including KCET/Los Angeles Local Hero of the Year Award 2008, NAD Breakthrough Awards 2017, SAG-AFTRA Harold Russell Award 2018, and a honorary degree from Gallaudet University 2020-2021.

Andraéa LaVant is a black disabled woman boldly confronting the world's expectations of her existence by living fully and authentically. She has over 15 years of experience working within non-profit, corporate, federal, and philanthropic systems to advance access, equity, and inclusion for people with disabilities. Equal parts grace and sass, Andraéa is known both for her style and for her ability to speak truth in spaces where ignorance and injustice have historically prevailed. She is widely recognized for spearheading a global disability justice movement as an impact producer for Oscar-nominated film, Crip Camp, executive produced by the Obamas. LCI's specialty is helping brands "speak disability with confidence." Andraéa's work and insights have been featured on Good Morning America, NBC, Essence, PAPER, the Root, Rolling Stone, and a host of other national media.

While 61 million Americans have disabilities, they are the most under-represented population in entertainment and media. As someone with a disability myself, I launched the Film Challenge in 2013 in response to the under-representation of talent with disabilities both in front of and behind the camera to give aspiring filmmakers the opportunity to showcase their work and provide them with meaningful exposure. In 2017, I joined forces with Easterseals – the nation's leading nonprofit supporting people and families with disabilities – to expand the event, now known as the Easterseals Disability Film Challenge.

She has held executive positions at local, federal, and national levels and was the Board President of National Alliance on Mental Illness. Myrick's work, research and advocacy has a focus on lived experience, digital therapeutics, race equity and disability justice. She was instrumental in the work of The Voice Awards that recognized community leaders and members of the entertainment industry for their efforts to raise awareness about the importance of behavioral health and spread the message that people can and do recover from mental health conditions and substance use disorders. Myrick is a Certified Personal Medicine Coach, has a M.S. in organizational psychology from the California School of Professional Psychology of Alliant International University and MBA from Case Western Reserve University's Weatherhead School of Management.



LINDSAY CRAIN

Lindsay is the Director of Content and Community at Undivided, sharing their mission to empower and support parents raising children with disabilities. As the parent of a teenager with disabilities, she is dedicated to promoting inclusive education through her roles in state and local special ed advisory committees. Before venturing into disability advocacy, Lindsay worked in film acquisitions and development at companies including United Artists/MGM, Fine Line Features/New Line Cinema, Picturehouse, and the Meyers-Shyer Company/Disney. All of her roles have been rooted in showcasing storytelling as a catalyst for change.

Ranell Shubert is the Nonfiction Access Initiative (NAI) Funds Program Manager at the International Documentary Association (IDA), a movement aimed at narrative change through building power and community and increasing opportunities for nonfiction media-makers who identify as disabled.
